Elsie Yanik Award Recipient for 2015

The provincial council annually presents the Elsie Yanik Award which was created in 1997 to commemorate the leadership, ministry and service of Elsie Yanik to the Catholic community in the Diocese of Mackenzie-Fort Smith. Elsie's achievements are many and she has received a blessing from Pope John Paul II for her work within the Catholic Church. She has spent most of her long life spreading kindness, preserving Indigenous heritage and promoting health and education in her community. She has been a strong advocate for native women. At 97, she still works as an elder. Award recipients are nominated for their qualities and service to the church and their community.

This year, we had the distinct pleasure of presenting this award to Alice Mullink, who has been a CWL member for over 40 years. The small community of Whitelaw has no businesses, but has a beautiful church. About 25 people attend mass and are served by the priest from Grimshaw.

Alice has kept the parish functioning for the past 25 years. She has been for the past 10 years, the Sacristan, Altar Server, Eucharistic Minister and Lector. Alice also assists the Priest with the funeral masses. She organizes the cleaning of the church and the decorating of the church for special occasions, as well as organizing the after mass lunches and funeral lunches. For the past year, she has organized the music for services as the music leader no longer lives in the community. Alice serves as a member of the Parish council in Grimshaw representing the Whitelaw church. Alice has also been the driving force in keeping the CWL going in this parish. With only a few members left and an aging population, Alice has been the secretary-treasurer for 15+ years. If it was not for the CWL council taking care of the church, the ministries and the parish, the church would have been closed long ago.

As part of her CWL role for the past 10 years, she has organized the donation on behalf of the CWL to the local Festival of Trees for Palliative Care. Some years she has sewn or quilted a wall hanging or Advent calendar. These were donated from the Whitelaw CWL, which were then bid on and the proceeds were given to the Palliative Care. We want to thank and congratulate Alice for her dedication to the "League".

ALBERTA MACKENZIE

Update from Provincial President Cathy B.

Alberta Mackenzie Provincial Council recorded 9,560 members from Alberta and the Northwest Territories. It has 35 life members, four of whom are honorary life members.

The provincial council was delighted to welcome National President Barb Dowding to the provincial convention in Yellowknife, and at the St. Paul diocesan convention. Barb spoke about the national theme, One Heart, One Voice, One Mission.

Councils at all levels have adopted the theme particularly in spiritual programs. During the year greater awareness has been focused on the Year of Consecrated Life. The rosary for peace is being said on Tuesdays, specifically to end violence in the Middle East.

Three membership awards are given for increase in membership—total number of members in a parish council, greatest percentage increase of members and greatest number of brand new members to the League. The greatest percentage increase was 61% and greatest increase in numbers was 30 new members. Because other councils ask us what is the key to success, we have prepared, from the comments and ideas given to us, a membership ideas booklet for sharing among the councils.

Besides personal contact, which is the best way to retain and recruit members, councils report that vocal support of the League in the parish by their spiritual advisor promotes a strong council.

The provincial council has been working on an initiative to lobby and petition for an independent senior's advocate. It urges "the Alberta Provincial Government to amend the Alberta Health Act to ensure that the Seniors' Advocate is an Officer of the Legislature and therefore independent".

Three of five diocesan councils elected a full slate of officers as did the provincial council for the 2015-2017 term; all councils have new executives.

At the 93rd annual **Calgary diocesan** convention, held at St. Mary's University College, the speakers, Dr. Trent Davis and Dr. Linda Dudar, addressed the national theme. St. Mary's was the first Catholic university to offer an

elementary level education degree specifically designed to prepare teachers for Catholic schools. The council raised over \$1.4 million to support St. Mary's and the CWL Chair for Catholic Studies. Dr. Dudar created a song on the new theme. The song's words and music are available on the diocesan website as is a stained-glass type design that illustrates the theme.

Bishop Fred Henry (Calgary) also spoke on the pope's Extraordinary Jubilee of Mercy.

At the fall meeting, the executive will adopt a revised policy and procedures manual for councils in the diocese. This document was revised in order to align it with national *Constitution & Bylaws* and *National Manual of Policy and Procedure.*

Calgary Diocesan Council is hosting the annual national convention from August 19-21, 2019.

Edmonton Diocesan Council is pleased to share the news of the addition of a new parish council from the recently created parish of Corpus Christi.

Their council borrowed a promising idea from sisters in the Calgary diocese and has introduced "Parish Buddies". Each diocesan officer has a portion of the parish councils in the diocese assigned to her for personal or phone contact for encouragement and support.

The $93^{\rm rd}$ annual Edmonton diocesan convention theme was Joyfully Serving with One Heart One Voice One Mission.

Speakers addressed the joy of the gospel from a social justice viewpoint, celebrating the strengths and achievements of Aboriginal women, maintaining joy during life trials and fostering joy and generosity at home. A scholarship is given to a seminarian at Newman Theological College. The diocesan council hosts a poster essay contest to encourage students and teachers to focus on their faith and what it means to them.

Financial sponsorship of over \$12,000 was given to the Wild West Catholic Youth Conference.

During the next two years the diocesan council hopes to build on the theme of joy and how it is to be found in abundance through membership in the League. Another focus will be to find ways to attract younger members to the League and keep them!



The **Grouard-McLennan diocesan council** hosted a spiritual workshop with guest speaker Life Member Lucille Partington who spoke on encounters with Jesus.

She directed members to ask, "When and where did we meet Jesus and who introduced us?"

Then members mapped their lives and relationship with Jesus.

The **Mackenzie-Fort Smith diocesan council** consists of three growing and active parish councils. The councils cover a large geographical space and the distance between towns presents travel challenges.

Because of the expense for travel the provincial council has a fundraising campaign called "Nickels for the North" to support travel from northern communities to meetings and conventions.

One council began a "two by two" approach this year and have two co-presidents. This approach is working well and the members are comfortable in sharing the role.

Some focuses include researching homelessness in communities and making suggestions on how the League can offer assistance and the best way to show support for missing and murdered indigenous women.

Both the national and provincial presidents were in attendance and spoke at the annual **St. Paul diocesan** convention.

The direction for the next two year term will be on membership and leadership, challenging members to increase membership by 60 women in commemoration of 60 years presence in the diocese.

This thought led to grander thinking. It would be wonderful if the 100th anniversary of the League coming in 2020 might spur a membership increase back to 100,000.

The **Alberta Mackenzie Provincial Council** is leading the way in fundraising for the Catholic Women's League Leadership Foundation. Archbishop Smith was among 150 guests at the kickoff event, a delicious and inspiring brunch at the Chateau Louis Hotel and Conference Centre on June 20th. The event was organized by Fran Lucas, Becky Kallal, Pam De Luca and Dorothy Johansen. Approximately \$8,900 was raised for the **Catholic Women's League Leadership Foundation**.

A national League focus is the development of relationships with First Nations women. Following the Hope Decoded Summit, one of the officers who had attended reminded the members that the reality of all relationships is trust, which cannot be developed overnight. It cannot come from a directive or resolution. If the League is going to be successful in this endeavour it will need to engage in meaningful conversations as equals and will require one on one encounters.

It is only through these conversations that mutual respect will be achieved and through this respect possibly a relationship can be built.

Members are actively involved with the Canadian Catholic Organization for Development and Peace goals as well as combating human trafficking and euthanasia. It is an ongoing activity to stay up-to-date on social media without being overwhelmed by it. Media can be used for evangelization, evaluation and promotion of good content.

In the next two years, the provincial council aims to examine the Truth and Reconciliation Commission of Canada report and see where League can take action or provide support on the recommendations.

Members will be encouraged, at events to which we are called to speak, to recognize whose traditional lands we are on and which treaty the agreement base we work from. Red Deer would be on Treaty 6 and Treaty 7 Lands, divided by the Red Deer River. These are the traditional lands of the Cree and Blackfoot. The research to discover this information gives members another opportunity to honour First Nation brothers and sisters.

The provincial council intends to be a channel to develop and suggest action and education of key topics on Pope Francis' new encyclical *Laudato Si.*

We will be engaging and uniting with the World Meeting of Families theme *Love is Our Mission, the Family Fully Alive*; emphasizing that the family is a vocation of love. The coming Extraordinary Jubilee of Mercy gives the opportunity to live and proclaim the joy of the gospel.

Newly recruited members want to know they are making a difference with their time, and time spent together is used efficiently and effectively.



Existing members can speak to these concerns and demonstrate how women can make change in society.

Each diocesan council will examine the method of reporting completed by parish councils in the hope to make it a less daunting task. The work done by other provincial and diocesan councils provide excellent models. \mathbf{T}

As National President Barb Dowding challenged at the provincial convention, "We are to abandon the complacent attitude that says we have always done it this way and embrace bold and creative rethinking, not alone but as a community."



95th Annual CWL National Convention: Highlights from the Guest Speakers – Submitted by June F.

The keynote address was given by Dr. Josephine Lombardi, who spoke on "One Heart, One Voice, One Mission". Dr. Lombardi is an Assistant Professor of Pastoral and Systematic Theology, Professor of Field Education, and Director of Lay Formation for St. Augustine's Seminary in Scarborough, Ontario. Each day she spoke on one part of our theme and reminded us that God works through our hearts and uses our voices so that we can achieve our mission.

Bishop Gary Gordon, from the Diocese of Victoria spoke to us on "The Abundant Heart and Our Mission's Call". He told our group that we know how to roll up our sleeves and help. He indicated that we have two great characteristics: a good heart and a strong mind. He reminded us that isolation is the greatest poverty in this world, but as women of the CWL, we have a strong sisterhood and we truly support each other and those in need.

Pavel Reid, the Director of the Office of Life and Family with the <u>Roman Catholic Archdiocese of Vancouver</u> spoke to us about "The Synod on the Family and the New Evangelization". He spoke about Pope Francis recognizing that all churches are in trouble and hence the reason for organizing the Synod of the Family. He indicated that where families are strong, people stay in the church. When there is a breakdown in a family, the trend is for people to leave the church. It is time for us to take an active role in evangelization and we need to be a welcoming force for others to see.

Next year's convention will be held in Halifax, Nova Scotia on August 14-17th, 2016.



CWL National Convention, 2015

The 95th Annual Convention was held in Vancouver August 16 – 18, 2015 with business meetings before and after the annual convention for the National Council. The theme of One Heart, One Voice, One Mission was well incorporated. Forty-three CWL members from Alberta Mackenzie were in attendance; four Honorary Life Members, Presidents from four of our five diocesan councils, the Provincial President, President Elect and Vice President and at least five people who had never been to a national convention from Alberta Mackenzie. Twenty-eight members in attendance were not accredited or voting delegates.

15 new Life Members were commissioned.

Many of the Alberta Delegation were at the Resolutions dialogue on the Sunday afternoon. The two resolutions that Alberta Mackenzie had sent to national did not come to the floor. Eleven resolutions were sent to the national convention but only five made it to the floor.

These resolutions were passed:

- 2015.01 Increased Early Intervention and Access to Children and Youth Mental Health Services
- 2015.02 Ban Plastic Microbeads in Personal Products
- 2015.03 Banning the Use of Neonicotinoid Pesticides
- 2015.04 Invoke Section 33 of the Canadian Charter of Rights and Freedoms in the case of Carter v Canada
- 2015.05 Reinstatement of the Mandatory Long-Form Census

Honorary Life Member Claire Herron made a presentation on the CWL Leadership Foundation. The assembly carried the motion that the national council would donate \$400,000.00 from the national treasury to the Catholic Women's League Leadership Foundation. More information will be given out following their meeting after the convention.

The Euthanasia Prevention Coalition (EPC) was voted to be added for a five year period to the National Voluntary Funds.

A new song has been chosen from among fifteen entries to add to our repertoire of song to Our Lady of Good Counsel. The song will not replace 'Our Lady of Good Counsel' but will provide another resource. We can also use any of the submission form our own province. Bishop McGrattan gave the direction that a Marian hymns such as Our Lady of Good Counsel during mass is to be used at the Offertory or Communion of mass and not as an processional or recessional song.

The Video Testimonial Project has been completed and will be 'rolled' out in the Fall. It will be accessible through YouTube and will replace the DVD "For God and Canada". Parts of the video were viewed during the convention and three of our own members are featured in the video. A motion was passed from the floor during convention; that the National Council reaffirms the League's position on the respect for human life by writing to the offices of the Prime Minister, Minister of Health, to request the federal government to halt distribution of the abortion drug RU-486.

All members are asked to write letters on this subject and to speak to all their local candidates in this time of election campaigning.

CWL Gives.....

According to policy, all **National Voluntary Funds** are distributed at or immediately following convention.

\$35,197.65 to Catholic Missions in Canada **\$28,971.75** to Coady **\$64,691.48** to CCODP (Development & Peace) **\$24,028.57** to Velma's Dream – CNEWA

\$4370.75 from the Mass Collection at national convention went to Our Lady of Good Counsel Domestic Abuse Services of Vancouver.

It is worth noting that this year's donation to Canadian Catholic Organization for Development and Peace was the lowest ever. Councils are asked to remind members about the CWL program that encourages us to give 1% of what we spend on luxury and personal items to aid those less fortunate.

National Convention – Spiritual Highlights Submitted by Judy L.

This statement was very much reflected by the spiritual program at National Convention 2015. It stayed true to the belief that CWL meetings should be divided into thirds... spiritual, business and social. The one third spiritual wove the thread of One Heart, One Voice and One Mission throughout all the Eucharist liturgies and prayer services.

From the Opening Eucharistic Liturgy Sunday evening to the Closing Eucharistic Liturgy on Wednesday you felt the breadth and depth of the CWL, rooted in Jesus Christ.

Waiting with 800 women (and some men as well) at St. Francis Xavier Church the site of the Marian Shrine of Our Lady of Sheshan the opening Eucharistic Celebration began with a sense of pride and awe with the realization of the connectedness of the country. The first call to prayer was gifted to the assembly by members of the Squamish Nation Decent with a First Nations Smudging with Sacred Medicines ceremony led by Rennie Nahanee, First Nations Ministry Coordinator of the Diocese of Vancouver. His introduction of the members of the Squamish Nation Descent reminded all that our nation includes other nations all under the watchful eye of the Creator. The Sacred Medicines used were coast dried cedar, sage, tobacco, and incense. As they were lit and the smoke began to rise Renee explained the significance of the ceremony.

The sacred smoke prepares the people for their participation as they invite the smoke to touch their eyes, ears, mouth, mind and body in order to see and feel things clearly.

The congregation followed his directions and invited the smoke to cleanse them as well. He then taught the Squamish word and hand gesture for thank you which is to raise the arms palms up and move them up and down. Within in the church you could hear the grateful silence as we thanked Renee.

The choir began to sing as the procession of flags began making visual our oneness as an organization. The oneness continued as we sang O Canada. Beautiful music invited all members to

raise their voices in grateful thanks and praise as we welcomed the liturgical procession with "Here I am Lord!"

In his homily Archbishop Miller set the tone for the convention as he developed the theme - One Heart, One Voice and One Mission. He gave thanked CWL for its prophetic wisdom. He mentioned that women give "healing mercy" to the world; gather strength from the Eucharist and tend to see everything through the lens of God. He set the tone for a very blessed convention.

Women know the remedy for this broken world because they see the precious dignity of all persons no matter who or what state they are in. This is rooted in our belief in Jesus.

Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday also honoured the one third philosophy in structuring meetings. Part of the spirituals on Monday and Tuesday included worship as Mass was celebrated in the convention room. Each bishop developed the theme in his homily. Most Rev. Stephen Jensen from the Diocese of Prince George reminded us that our actions have eternal consequences. Our humble efforts will be transfigured as we offer them to the Father. Most Rev. Richard Gagnon, Archbishop of Winnipeg challenged us to have hearts on fire and not be afraid to praise and proclaim the Word so our mission can be fulfilled.

Prayer services gave the ladies had time to reflect on the theme as they participated in reflections on Mary and Elizabeth, Unity of Mission and All Creation Celebrates the Wonders of God. Two mornings the assembly prayed the Liturgy of the Hours from Shorter Christian Prayer Week IV. The Year of Consecrated Life was acknowledged by prayer for an increase in vocations and Our Lady became present through the Angelus and the prayer to Our Lady of Good Counsel.

Deceased members and spiritual advisors were remembered with a Memorial Service on Monday and the Commissioning of the Life Members took place within the Tuesday morning mass reminding the assembly that membership in the Catholic Women's League of Canada is a ministry. A Prayer Room was available for those who wanted some time for personal prayer.

Holy Rosary Cathedral rang out with song as it hosted the closing Eucharistic Celebration with Archbishop Miller as the main celebrant and Bishop McGrattan the homilist. As the convention drew to a close Bishop McGratten reminded all the importance of being women of One Heart, One Voice and One Mission. As the flags were retired we once again saw our connectedness and the awesome responsibility given to us through our vision statement "for God and Canada".

Convention 2015 lived up to the League's profession that "Spiritual growth is the very heart of the League and the essence of its existence." We all left a little better equipped to live out One Heart, One Voice and One Mission knowing that we are always fed and sustained by our spiritual life through prayer and the Eucharist.

CHRISTIAN FAMILY LIFE

I am very pleased to be on the Alberta Mackenzie Provincial Council as the standing chairperson of "Christian Family Life".

The duties of the chairperson are to work on marriage and family, sanctity of life, and minister to the needs of the youth, seniors, widowed, separated and divorced and vocations.

To begin with, I am filled with joy to announce that at St. Joseph's Seminary located in the City of Edmonton had over fifty young men attending the college for the 2014 and 2015. The seminary accepts young men from the provinces of British Columbia, Alberta, Saskatchewan and Manitoba. This past June two young men were ordained to the priesthood for the Diocese of Manitoba. Your prayers are requested for these people to carry on in their studies.

Assisted suicide legislation is being worked on at present and there is a great demand for attention and action. At this time, each member should contact their members of parliament by writing letters and making a visit to their office. The letter writing guide is on the national website (<u>www.cwl.ca</u>) under resources and Handbook for Secretaries-Personal letter writing guide.

Under the standing committee of Christian Family Life falls the Ministry to Separated and Divorced. Pope Francis has declared that divorced Catholics who remarry, as well as their children deserve better treatment from the church. He has mentioned that hope among many Catholics that HE might lift the Communion ban. This coming fall, the Vatican is holding a month long follow up on family issues. Pope Francis is also concerned about the up-bringing of children when a divorce does order. How are the children brought up---practicing their faith and receiving the sacraments?

In the next couple of months, I will be working on communiqués focusing on the family, assisted suicide, seniors' issues and disabled.

- Canadian Catholic Organization for Development and Peace (CCODP) CCODP is Canada's official Catholic overseas development organization, launched by the CCCB.
- **developing countries** To help a family become economically independent is to help a community become economically independent.

"Wherever there are people in need of food and drink, clothing, housing, medicine, employment, education; wherever (people) lack the facilities necessary for living a truly human life or are afflicted with serious distress or illness or suffer exile or imprisonment, there Christian charity should seek them out and find them, console them with great solicitude, and help them with appropriate relief. This obligation is imposed above all upon every prosperous nation and person." (Decree on the Apostolate of the Laity)

How does the Community Life Standing Committee connect with our theme? **One Heart** – Listen, (hear) and love with compassion and mercy. **One Voice** – Spread the Good News with joy; evangelize; speak out without fear.

One Mission – Accept and meet the challenge joyfully. Take action!
